13:45	<u>Exclusions</u> This session has been designed following many requests from Governing Bodies, Head Teachers and Local Authorities to provide training for governors likely to be involved in deciding whether to uphold Fixed Term or Permanent Exclusions. The session will provide in depth guidance on the law and procedure to ensure that decisions are taken lawfully and will be robust if challenged through an Independent Review Panel, the Department for Education, or a court. This will include an explanation of the aspects of the Equality Act 2010 and Human Rights Act 1998 which should be considered by governors when making decisions. Independent Review Panels have the power to quash Governing Body decisions, but attendees at this session will be provided with the tools to reduce the risk of this happening to their school and to make sure that they make higher quality and fairer decisions in the future.
